Moorland Hub update

The first few weeks of the academic year have seen the new Moorland Hub – Boasley Cross, Bridestowe, Lydford, Milton Abbot and Northlew – begin their journey of working together for the benefit of all our children. This week, children from the hub came together to form two teams at the Okehampton Area Year 5/6 football festival. All the children had a great time with friends being made – 2^{nd} place for the Bridestowe/Milton Abbot team and 4^{th} for the Boasley/Northlew team was a great achievement. The highlight of my day, was on leaving hearing a child say to a new friend "Thanks, mate, see you next week at the Cross Country!" – testament to the aim of building relationships in our small schools. Similarly, last week Year 3/4 Boasley children travelled to Bridestowe for a rugby festival.

Also this week, we have confirmed our annual trip to the Pantomime on December 13th where all 5 schools will come together for a fun Christmas celebration. Residentials for Year 3/4, hosted at Bradford primary with outdoor activity and surfing in late June and Year 5 to Bristol at the end of June. These will include all Moorland Hub, Ruby Hub and Exbourne primary, bringing together all the small schools (Under 100 pupils) in Dartmoor Multi Academy Trust. Information sessions for the Trust wide Year 6 trip to France are also upcoming.

At Boasley this week, the first Stay and Play session was a huge success with 10 families joining the event. It was lovely to welcome new babies and toddlers to our school and meet new adults. Look out for similar events at all the Hub Schools.

Bridestowe welcomed Devon Wildlife Trust to the school with a focus on identifying trees from their leaves and making nature crowns – a lovely event to be part of! Forest school is an important focus for all Moorland Hub Schools.

At Lydford last Sunday, a family working party day attracted nearly 30 adults and children coming together to tidy the forest school. A fantastic event with real community spirit – thank you to all who took part. Look out for similar events at all the Hub Schools.

Northlew joined Boasley this week for a trip to Paignton Zoo - a fantastic day for all which mirrored Lydford's trip last week. The children loved seeing the animals and exploring the sustainability messages.

Milton Abbot have been enjoying meeting new friends from the Hub this week and taking part in the aforementioned football with friends from Bridestowe was a real high. The team finished 2^{nd} , only being pipped 1-0 by Okehampton C.

A final word to thank families for their support with positive attendance. I am aware my approach to attendance this term has caused some discussion, however I am pleased to report that the Moorland Hub has the highest attendance figures for the Trust with Bridestowe topping the table for attendance and the lowest amount of persistent absence. The evidence is irrefutable that high attendance directly correlates to positive achievement and I thank you for your continued support.

What a fabulous week we have had in Snowy Owls!

In maths, children have been developing their knowledge of placing tens and ones on a number line. We have had a great deal of fun with this, drawing number lines in chalk on the playground to ten, and one hundred!

In English, we have been learning all about our new book 'Dadaj's Paintbrush, developing our understanding of how to use apostrophes and questions whilst speaking and learning to understand and deal with our emotions.

In Art, we have started to work on our final piece focusing on 'line drawing'. Using the simplicity of drawing lines, we are working to create a piece of art based on water. We can't wait to show you all our final pieces.

Hawk owls

This week in Hawk Owls we have been learning how to draw number lines up to 1000- 10,000 and how to estimate numbers on number lines.

We have been celebrating the return of Rama and Sita from a Hindu story retelling the story and drawing Rangoli patterns in the small playground using different media.

Eagle Owls News

On Monday, we had baby ducklings come in for assembly. They were 2 weeks old but one was one day older than the other. The teachers and children got to hold and pet the baby ducklings and everyone had a lot of fun but had to stay really quiet and silent because we didn't want to scare the baby runner ducks away. We sat in a line and they raced each other. No one lost or won the race and they went wherever they wanted to go so they did and they were soft and they were runner ducks and they were babies and they were tall ducks for baby ducklings but they were excited ducks! (Coen)

On Tuesday, we did science. So basically, we were figuring out how to separate mixtures. We watched a cartoon video and there was a triangle who had a collection of manky, grotty toenails (they were pure yellow) mixed with sand, water mixed with sand, water mixed with salt and there was a challenge that was separating sand and salt. To separate the toenails and sand, you need a sieve to put the solids in, then you need to shake the sieve vigorously for the sand to go through the holes because the holes are bigger than the sand, however the toenails won't go through the holes, do you know why? If you don't, it is because the yucky toenails are bigger than the holes.

To separate the water and sand you have to filter it. You need filter paper to do it. You have to let the water go through the little hole at the bottom of the filter paper and the sand will stay in the paper. You have now earned yourself some pure water (just some realistic information, it would probably taste a bit sandy).

To separate salt and water you need to evaporate the water by boiling it. The water will turn into steam but the salt will not evaporate because it is a solid and solids don't evaporate. (Harry F)

On Thursday we played a football tournament at Okehampton primary school, we borrowed some players from Bridestowe primary School. Joey, Arthur and William. Joey's strength was midfield, Authur's Strength was striker and William's strength was defence. (Leo C6)
