Dear families,

We certainly hope that you can all join us for that and would like to extend the invitation to extended family, friends and the community too. Additionally, we have visits planned to Waitrose in Okehampton, to sing carols; Abbeyfield Residential Home, to share some Christmas spirit and a range of visitors joining us in the coming weeks, from the Fire Service, National Marine Aquarium, and online seminars about how we can protect our planet.

We would love to invite you to come and see our tree (as well as all the other trees at Tavistock Tree Festival), from the 1st of December at **St Eustachius' Church** in Tavistock. The children's decorations will be on display as well as the efforts of staff to make the tree look pretty!

Finally, I am looking for some volunteers to come and help with a few jobs that need doing around the school. My plan is to take a few hours one weekend, where jobs such as clearing guttering, pruning back plants, cutting grass and helping to sort our drainage issue on the main gate at the top of the to-do list. For Diwali, we looked at the celebration, and the children drew connections to similar festivities they've experienced. They thoroughly enjoyed crafting Rangoli patterns using coloured rice.

This week's highlight in Owlets was the presence of diggers on-site. The children were captivated watching them at work, eagerly asking questions and learning more. We had a delightful digger day filled with fun activities—creating digger images, playing with our diggers in class, and writing about them. I was immensely proud of how well the children applied their phonics knowledge to write words and captions.



In maths, we have finished battling with long division and multiplication (for now) and are about to embark on learning more about fractions. Children have been working hard on their Times Tables Rockstars scores to improve their mental arithmetic after being given a fantastic wakeup call by a member of Hawk Owls. Don't let it be said that we aren't a little competitive! In other subjects, we continue to study the importance of scores to the meaning and feeling of a film, making pop-up books, learning how to effectively use search engines on the internet, designing Christmas tree decorations and, of course, leaning about the population of the world in Geography.
